British Library Sacred Texts: <https://www.bl.uk/sacred-texts#>

If you want to improve your knowledge of a range of historical sacred texts the British Library online has some amazing exhibits. There are teaching resources, articles as well as beautiful photographs of the texts and artefacts in their collection. The resources cover all the major faiths



covered by locally agreed syllabuses in the area and a range

of ages, with a particular focus on secondary schools. There are scholarly articles that address a range of ethical and religious issues, using the texts in the collection as a basis. There are illuminated texts, texts focusing on the role of women in faith, how texts are used in devotion and their history. The collection can be searched by theme, or by faith. There are videos and lesson ideas as well.



There are plans to extend the materials to provide information and activities aimed at younger children.

When you can get out on visits, there are regularly excellent exhibitions, and these can be facilitated by the education department.

At this time of being unable to visit a place of worship, Westminster Abbey has created a range of resources including a virtual tour of the Abbey. There are resources for primary and secondary schools, covering a range of topics. Some of the resources link to other subjects, such as history and English as well. There are PowerPoints and PDFs to download, many of them containing beautiful pictures of artefacts belonging to the Abbey. Topics include a guide to each of Lent, Holy Week, Easter. There are challenging questions for older pupils such as “Why is the resurrection so important to Christians today?” and videos of debates about Islamophobia and LGBTQ issues.

Both of these websites have a range of resources and background information for teachers. There are lesson plans to download and themes to explore, and with the suggestion from the Commission on Religious Education Report that worldviews should form part of the study in RE, these resources are worth checking out.







Some resources you might want to explore ready for the new year:

Blockbuster Bible – This is suitable for years 5 and 6, and with the teacher's book offer lesson plans, activities, games and video clips. It is published by Lion Hudson and is available through online bookshops. This publisher has a large range of other resources for religious education, including a Bible Handbook, a history of the Bible and a Bible Atlas.





Bible Infographics for Kids – There are two volumes in this series that contain colourful creations visually depicting the key concepts, important people, and most unusual facts from the Bible in a new and exciting way.

For instance, did you know? You'd need 7,453,506 soccer balls to fill up Noah's Ark. Paul travelled over 10,000 miles on his missionary journeys-the distance from New York City to Rio Grande at the tip of South America. There is a talking donkey in the Bible. There is also a Bible timeline board game that folds out from the middle of the book. Available on Amazon (and elsewhere online).

Alongside the workshops, the whole school could take part in a fun-filled interactive assembly performance on the ***Parable of The Lost Coin***. The ***Selfish Giant*** workshops are based on the story by Oscar Wilde and consider how the giant's actions can impact others, himself and the world around him. The workshops links to British Values, Literacy and PSHE. They can also extend to include RE.

Springs workshops will be a great way to bring children back together when the schools re open, through fun, energetic and creative sessions.
